### 17 YEAR-OLD GRANDSON OF MR. AND MRS. BROSMAN FATAALLY INJURED AT EDEN

Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Brozman of Pinedale were saddened this week by the death of their six-year-old grandson, Lawrence Cady of Eden who was fatally injured when he was struck by an automobile. He is also a nephew of Mrs. Lloyd Alexander of Pinedale.

The little fellow, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Cady, was struck by a car Sunday, as he crossed the road from the Eden store to his home. Mrs. Cady, who was sitting on the porch of her home visiting a friend, said she saw the boy pause on one side of the road to wait for a southbound car to pass. As he crossed the dividing lane, a northbound car struck the boy, knocking him down and passing completely over him. None of the wheels of the car touched him. He received cuts about the face and head and a brain concussion, from which he died on Tuesday evening at 6:40 o'clock, without regaining consciousness, at the Wyoming General Hospital at Rock Springs.

Driver of the car was John Hall Moss, an instructor in geology at Harvard university. Moss was chief of a party of student geologists sent out from Harvard this summer to examine a Yuma culture site near Eden. The expedition is an effort to determine the age of the civilization whose records have been left in that area. Moss postponed a planned return to his home in Lexington, Pennsylvania following the accident. A coroner's jury ruled that Moss be exonerated from the death of the small boy after hearing the evidence presented showing the accident was unavoidable.

Funeral services for Lawrence will be held at two o'clock Saturday afternoon at the Farson community hall. The Reverend Ben Rodda, pastor of the Eden valley Nazarene church will conduct the services and burial will be made in the Farson cemetery.

Lawrence is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Cady of Eden; two brothers, Ralph and Jimmy; two sisters, Ada Mae and Shirley; his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Brozman of Pinedale; and his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Mathilda Cady of Marshall, Minnesota.

Relatives who have arrived from out of state are three sisters of Mrs. Cady: Mrs. John O'Brien, Kansas City, Missouri; Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Bakula of St. Anthony, Idaho, and Mr. and Mrs. Miles Acheson, Denver, Colorado. A sister of Mr. Cady and Mrs. Lloyd Alexander, Mrs. Oma Johnson and two brothers from Marshall, Minnesota are also planning to come for the services.

Superintendent W. R. Carmichael reports an enrollment of 256 students in Pinedale school at the close of the first week of studies. Of that number 181 are enrolled in the grade school and 75 in high school. Enrollment by grades is as follows: first—33; second—26; third—22; fourth—27; fifth—19; sixth—17; seventh—20; eighth—17.

In high school there are 27 students in the ninth grade; 25 in the tenth; eleven in the eleventh; and ten in the twelfth.

The teaching staff has been organized with Superintendent Carmichael instructing typing and Spanish; Mrs. Richardson, English; Mrs. Paul Page, Mathematics, Bookkeeping and Biology; Clyden Nimmicht, Sciences and American History; and Mrs. Bruce Watt who teaches a half day has classes in Civics and Physical Geography.

The student body has already chosen Mrs. Watt as Freshman sponsor; Mrs. Page for sophomores; Mr. Nimmicht for juniors; and Mrs. Richardson for the senior class.

It is expected the school lunch program will begin about October 1. Some of the equipment has not arrived yet, and work is going forward to equip the shop to be used for the serving of the lunches.

With the Eighth Army in Beppu, Kyushu, Japan—Pfc. Paul C. Hagenstein, son of Mrs. P. C. ### 100 ANTELOPE HAVE BEEN RECEIVED AT LOCKER PLANT FOR PROCESSING THIS YEAR

Bob Lloyd owner of Lloyd's Locker Plant reports that approximately 100 antelope have been brought to the local plant for processing during the first week of the season.

Eleven elk and five deer have also been checked in to date. The animals are all in fine condition and it is expected that the big game kill will be heavy this year.

### WILD HORSES BEING SENT TO EUROPE

Glenrock—Wild horses from Wyoming's famed Red desert country are being sent to Europe to replace that war-torn continent's greatly depleted stock of horses.

Frank Robbins, who runs about 400 horses on his ranch near here and who is owner of two famous wild horses, Desert Dust and Bitter Creek, revealed Saturday he has captured approximately 3,000 wild horses in the Red desert.

He has tracked many of the wild horses down by air in the Red desert area in southern Wyoming, and buyers are sending them to Europe.

"Contrary to what most people believe," Robbins said, "the wild horses I capture do not end up in soap and glue factories. Most of them eventually go overseas, and many have gone to Cuba."

Robbins said western buyers are taking the offspring of wild mares and quarter horse stallions he keeps on his ranch. He said he still catches a few of the old buckskins, the "Zebra Dupe" famous during Wyoming's historic Johnson county war.

He recently made a survey of wild horses on ranges in other western states and said he found only one spot, in Oregon, where wild horses still are plentiful. In some states a bounty of \$4 is being offered for the wild horses killed, and in Wyoming some ranchers are killing off wild horses because of the range they require.

Two years ago Frank Robbins corralled wild horses with the aid of airplanes on the mesa a few miles south of Pinedale in conjunction with the Taylor Grazing Service.

### JACK REYNOLDS OF CORA PASSED AWAY AT HOSPITAL IN JACKSON ON FRIDAY

The elderly gentleman had undergone an operation for appendicitis two weeks ago and since that time his condition had been regarded as grave. An early pioneer of Sublette County, he homesteaded in the Cora area many years ago.

He is survived by one son Sidney Reynolds of the Z Bar U Ranch at Cora and a daughter, Mrs. Henry Krichbaum of Rock Springs. His wife preceded him in death many years ago, and a son Spencer, passed away in April, 1939.
