The sophomore class has shown itself to be one of the leading classes in school and to be worthy of its position in good old KHS.



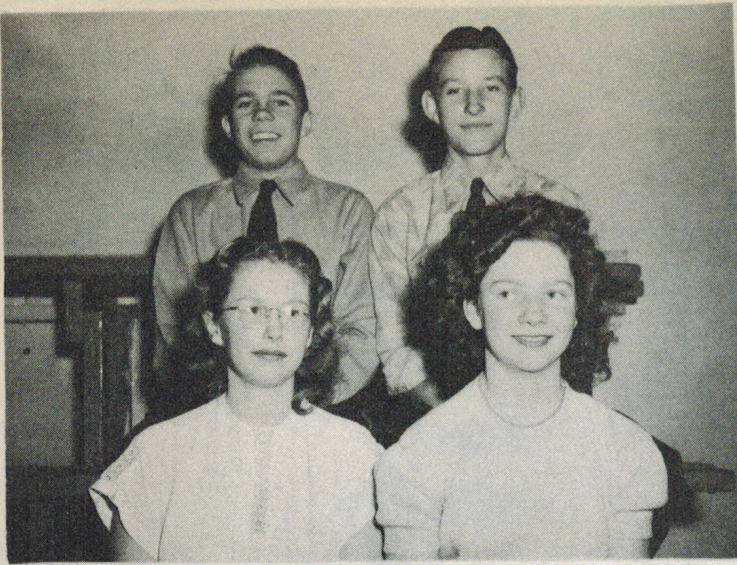
