

Wildlife Group Maps Legislative Action

Walker Heads Committee Named To Probe State Game Needs

In a move designed to strengthen its position atop Capitol Hill, the Utah Wildlife Federation Sunday set up a state-wide committee to correlate and draft a legislative program for submission at its next annual meeting.

W. A. Walker of Salt Lake City, secretary of the federation, was named committee chairman. He will select other members from throughout the state.

The action was taken at a special meeting at Newhouse hotel attended by nearly 100 officials of the state sportsmen's group. Walker explained need for such a committee by pointing out the "narrow squeaks" sportsmen had at the last legislative session. A notable example, he asserted, was passage of the big game damage bill by the house and senate. The bill (HB-257) was vetoed by the governor.

wide program of habitat improvement. One of the objectives will be to have every federal club launch a plant nursery project. Several of the clubs, notably the Box Elder Wildlife Federation and Salt Lake County Fish Assn., have already embarked on these projects.

Principal speaker was Ross Leonard, former state fish and game director, who read an address prepared by Dr. Ira N. Gabrielson, president of the Wildlife Management Institute. Dr. Gabrielson was unable to attend because of illness.

"As long as the human population continues to increase, wildlife populations must be produced by constantly decreasing habitat," Dr. Gabrielson's message said.

Deep sympathy "I am sometimes glad that my term as a wildlife administrator is finished," he wrote, "I feel a deep sympathy for those who are responsible for producing fish and game under our present American system. Regardless of how good the job may be there must be less fish and game per individual license sold in the future. Those who take their recreation in this manner may as well face this fact and govern their actions accordingly."

G. G. Sanderson of Fairview, newly-appointed member of the fish and game commission, spoke briefly on what he hopes to achieve in his new position.

"I am interested in improving bird habitat and I intend to see that our wardens are doing around tree-planting time. I believe that this program of improving habitat is extremely desirable."

Sanderson said he also was interested in a long-range program of fisheries improvement designed to make the state independent of outside sources of trout eggs.

Traces Program Jack Berryman, assistant federal aid coordinator for the game department, traced work done under the program and plans for the future. If the Dingel bill, providing federal aid to state fisheries, is passed by congress Utah's federal allotment may reach \$500,000, he estimated.

A guest was Luis Macias, chief of the department of game of Mexico, who is touring the state to pick up ideas for use by his nation.

The meeting was conducted by Verdel Ritten of Charleston, federation president.

WASHINGTON, April 10 (AP)—Georgetown hospital doctors reported Sunday that George Mikan, star of the Minneapolis Lakers, has a fractured right wrist.

The extent of Mikan's injury dealt a severe blow to the Basketball Association of America title hopes of the Lakers. Minneapolis is engaged in a best four out of seven championship series with the Washington Capitals.

The 6-foot 11-inch former De Paul University star was injured in a fall in last night's game, which Washington won, 83 to 71. Minneapolis won the first three games of the series and was a heavy favorite to take the B. A. A. crown.

Doctors said the scoring wizard's wrist was swollen nearly twice its normal size at mid-day.
