

## Combat Victim Rites Slated On Wednesday

Memorial graveside services for Pvt. Joseph Cyril Fitt, who was killed June 13, 1944, in France while serving with a paratrooper unit, will be conducted Wednesday at 6 p.m. in Taylorsville cemetery.

Services will be conducted under direction of Wilbur Cowley, bishop, Miller ward, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and Sugarhouse post, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

A son of Cyril Fitt, Pvt. Fitt was born March 22, 1922, in Draper, Salt Lake county. He enlisted in the U. S. army March 16, 1942, and received basic training at Fort Bragg, N. C., Camp Roberts, Cal., Fort Benning, Ga. As a paratrooper he was assigned to the 82nd airborne division and was sent overseas in April, 1943. Pvt. Fitt participated in the Italian and French invasions.

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railed truck on the last car raising a spectacular dust cloud.

A half mile further down in the Copperton yards, within sight of the Copperton grade school, the remaining cars sheared through a switch, flipped on their sides ripping off trucks and spewing forth ore.
