

TO HIS FINAL REST.

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Ministers of City United in Honoring Memory of Founder of the McKinley Home.

The funeral service of the late Dr. Uriah Gregory, founder of the McKinley Home for Boys, was held yesterday afternoon at the First Baptist Church. There was a large attendance. One hundred boys of the McKinley Home, in uniform, were a guard of honor for the remains of the man they loved. At the conclusion of the service the lads marched past the casket and each dropped on it a white carnation.

For more than forty years Dr. Gregory was a minister of the Baptist denomination. In later life he gave his time to philanthropic work, and as a culmination of his efforts in Los Angeles and vicinity, founded the McKinley Home at Artesia. Many boys who have passed through the home have learned to honor the man who did so much for them.

Prominent ministers of the city took part in the service yesterday, and united in honoring the memory of the man with whom they had worked. Those who took part were Rev. J. Q. A. Henry, pastor of the First Baptist Church, and his assistant, Rev. W. F. Irvine; Rev. Arthur Phelps, pastor of Central Baptist Church; Rev. A. C. Smither, of the First Christian Church, Rev. Hugh K. Walker, Rev. Robert J. Burdette, Dr. E. A. Healy and Prof. Foshay. The speakers told of the life and good works of the man who is gone, and each declared that the place left vacant by the death of Dr. Gregory will be hard to fill.

Dr. Gregory did not take up the ministry until his fortieth year. He soon became well known, however, because of his aggressive work. He spent many years of his life in Los Angeles. He leaves a widow and a daughter, Mrs. Arden B. Clark.
