Oil Well Begun On Lewis Ranch

The Ventura county oil field is moving into the Camarillo section. The Dabney interests have begun drilling on the J. F. Lewis ranch three miles south of Camarillo. This new well is down about 100 feet. It is the first hole to be put down south of the hills.

The Dabney company has a well on the Perkins ranch north of Camarillo on which they have been working for over a month.

The Dabney interests have leases on the Lewis, Perkins and Pleasant Valley Lemon company ranches. Dabney has taken extensive leases in Las Posas. Some smaller concerns have taken some leases in those sections.

Dabney and Doheny are not given to much speculation and the fact that they are taking leases indicates that they have assurances of oil lying under the territory.

At no far distant time Camarillo may change from a bean growing center to a center of oil production.

BEAN PRICES DEPEND ON PATRIOTISM OF GROWERS AND BROKERS

Prices of beans will not be fixed by the government if this important commodity does not advance to a prohibitive cost to the consumer. This is the word R. L. Churchill, manager for the California Lima Bean Growers' association, brought back from Washington where he went for a conference with H. C. Hoover, food dictator. He arrived in Oxnard this afternoon.

"That the government shall fix bean prices or take over the marketing of beans is not definitely settled," said Mr. Churchill. "Mr. Hoover made it plain that the President thru Mr. Hoover would take charge if prices became prohibitive, as beans are especially mentioned in the law."

"However," said Mr. Churchill, "Mr. Hoover appealed to the patriotism of the growers and brokers not to unduly advance the market and throw this burden on the government. Mr. Hoover urged them to be content with a fair profit."

"That means then that you will recommend to the directors that they do not fix the price of beans too high?" Mr. Churchill was asked.

"Not necessarily," he replied with a smile. "The directors will make a price that is right, however, and the government will permit a good price."

Mr. Churchill assented that 10-cent beans would not be high in comparison with \$2 wheat.

PARISH FORTUNATE IN ASSISTANT PASTOR

Liberty Army Soldiers May Study French

Opportunity for the men of Oxnard and vicinity drafted into the Liberty army to learn the rudiments of the French language has been presented. Mrs. H. Le Bel Winnette, whose native language is French, went to Principal Bannister of the high school yesterday and offered to teach classes of the drafted men without cost to the men, if Mr. Bannister and the school board approved the idea.

Mr. Bannister considered it a worthy idea and presented it to the school board. A room in the high school building will be provided for the classes by the board. Classes will be held in the evening. Two or three lessons will be given each week.

In the short time before the men will be called to the training camps there will not be an opportunity to teach the language at length, but the men can gain a start. Conversational phrases will be taught and the questions a man in strange country most frequently needs. Lessons will be given in pronouncing French.

If the work is to be undertaken all it must be done at once. Drafted men who are interested are requested to telephone to Mr. Bannister at the high school stating their desire to take the lessons and leaving their names for a call. This must be done this week.

ORDER PAVING ON TWO THRU STREETS

No protests having been received to the proposed paving to full width of Saviers road and Fifth street, the city trustees last night ordered the city clerk to advertise for bids for the paving. The bids will be received by the board September 11.

The county will pave thru the city on these streets to a width of 16 feet. The city will add two feet on each side of the Saviers road paving from the city limits to Third street, making the paving 20 feet wide, the same as the road from El Rio. Between Third street and Eighth street Saviers road will be paved full width, the additional paving being assessed to the property owners along the street. Fifth street will likewise be paved full width from Saviers road to the depot. East of the depot to the city limits the paving will be 16 feet wide.

C Street Paving.

The expected petition for the paving of C street was not presented to the trustees last night. The trustees discussed labor conditions at a public meeting of material. The opinion seemed unanimous that the board was better off to let the contract for paving of C street at this time, provided a price increase in price is made. A petition for paving of C street will be presented.
