ABATEMENT SUITS FILED AT VENTURA

Prosecutor Takes Action Against Places Involved in Vice Round-up

VENTURA, March 19.—Three abatement suits against property involved in the February raid in Oxnard's vice district were filed in Superior Court here today by Dist. Atty. Henderson, starting legal proceedings which may put padlocks on at least thirty asserted dens in that city.

Suits filed today by Henderson covered the building at 732 A street, Oxnard, owned by Yee Tong and occupied by Yvonne Lamar; the building at 721 China Alley, owned by Gee Sie and occupied by B. B. Calhoun and Doe Clunne, and John Doe Hughie and known as the Calhoun Pleasure Club and the building at 640 A street owned by C. G. Sunderman and occupied by B. B. Calhoun and John D. Clunne.

All of the complaints assert violation of the liquor possession law. Affidavits in these cases were made by Special Investigator Robert Abel, who worked under the direction of Prosecutor Henderson and Sheriff Clark.

Another Human Skeleton Found by Road Crew

THREE RIVERS, March 19. A human skeleton, believed that of an Indian unearthed by workmen on the California State highway while excavating for gravel above "Punkin Holler," has been taken to the park headquarters and after being placed together will be added to the museum.

High cheek bones were characteristic of the red man, while beads fashioned of shell were hung around the neck. The body had been buried in a sitting position. The skull bones were in perfect condition. Three of the teeth were missing and the others were worn flat.

While the road was under construction many bones were dug out by the steam shovels near "Punkin Holler" and it is believed to have been a burying ground for Indians who inhabited the Hospital Rock region.

GIRL LOSES FINGER AFTER AUTO SKIDS

She will lose part of the third finger on her right hand as a result of the crash. Miss Shaffer also was seriously bruised about the back. She was taken to the hospital for treatment and then removed to her home at 14416 Delano street. According to police report, Miss Shaffer and Walter L. Chadwell of 6768 Lexington avenue, Hollywood, were returning to Van Nuys. When the auto crossed Hazeltine it slipped and skidded and ran into a tree. Miss Shaffer being hurled through the windshield. Chadwell was not seriously injured, according to police.

Youth Sues His Sire to Recover Estate Money

SANTA ANA, March 19. — Appropriating his father's \$1000 that comprised an estate held in trust for the son, Timothy O. Graham, West Anaheim youth, has brought suit to recover the money. George N. Graham, the father, was appointed guardian of Timothy in 1916, and had charge of the estate for nine years. When Timothy reached his majority last December 1, he made request upon his father for the \$1000, he states, but the money was refused him.

The elder Graham had remarried in the interim between his appointment as Timothy's guardian and the son's twenty-first birthday. He, has admitted, according to Timothy's attorneys, that he used the money held in trust for the son. Attorneys Bishop and Wellington and O. A. Jacobs of Santa Ana, are counsel for young Graham.

FACES OLD CHARGE

Mexican Wanted Years for Murder to Be Arraigned Friday

SANTA ANA, March 19. — An information charging murder against Manuel Tafoya, La Habra Mexican, who escaped the consequence of his asserted crime for eight years, was filed today by Chief Deputy District Attorney Mosley in Superior Judge Williams court.

Tafoya is accused of slaying Juan Lopez during a gambling quarrel at La Habra in 1918. He fled after the killing and was understood to have made his escape into Mexico. Nothing further was heard of him until several weeks ago, when he was captured at Calexico, Imperial Valley's border city. Tafoya is scheduled to be arraigned on the charge next Friday at 9:30 a.m.

COTTON PLANTING AT CORCORAN UNDER WAY

CORCORAN, March 19.—Cotton planting began in this district last Monday, when C. H. Glenn commenced putting in 200 acres. A yield of 257 bales was harvested on this land last year. At the McKare ranch of 1800 acres, planting has also commenced. Planting will continue until about May 1. Conditions for planting are favorable for cotton as well as all other crops, the rains of February having put the soil in good condition. Where gravity water through ditches is available, there appears likely to be a large run of water for irrigation.

Patrons Object to Transfer at Head of School

PASADENA, March 19.—City Director William Easterbrook and a large delegation from the Parent-Teacher Association of the vocational school appeared before the Board of Education today to protest against the transfer of Principal Fred J. Becker to the new special attention school, but the board refused to alter its previous action in transferring Becker.

Protestants deplored the "injustice" of removing the principal of the vocational school after he had served in that capacity for twenty years. The change in personnel is a part of a general shake-up in the school system which took place in the board meeting Tuesday when it was decided to establish a second high school in the city.

KERN TAXPAYERS TO FORM ASSOCIATION

CHARTER ASKED FOR SANTA MONICA BANK

SANTA MONICA, March 19.—Application for a bank charter has been made to the Comptroller of Currency by L. M. Meeker of Long Beach, John B. Horback of Santa Monica, Coy Burnett, president of the Muth Company, and C. A. Elder of Alhambra. The institution is to be known as the Santa Monica National Bank and the application gives a capital of \$100,000, surplus of \$20,000 and undivided profits of \$10,000.
